From the Heart

Dear Friends in Christ,

At a Presbytery sponsored pastor retreat on Whidbey Island last month, Executive Presbyter Laura Terasaki spoke to our group about self-care. Laura stressed the need for us to pull back from our busy schedules—and with them, the sense that things will go awry if we are not involved in them—and make space for rest and renewal. To emphasize her point, she used illustrations from nature and agriculture, where plants, trees, and vines must winter and where farmers intentionally let their fields go fallow. These seasons of dormancy are necessary for healthy production in the future. Life without rest is not sustainable. Laura was speaking about ministry, but the concept holds for all of us.

I have written before about how February is my least favorite month, but Laura's comments have given me a new perspective. February is the perfect time for people to break free from the stresses of our normal calendars and allow ourselves to *winter* along with the rest of nature. In biology, the term *wintering* describes how plants and animals survive cold seasons by adapting their physiology to endure the winter conditions. In winter, certain animals adapt through hibernation or greatly curtail their movement. Many varieties of fruit trees require a certain number of chill hours—where temperatures are consistently below 45°F, for example—which allows trees to form winter buds. A proper chilling during the winter will foster strong growth in the spring.

Applying the concept of wintering to our lives means intentionally setting aside time for rest or sabbath. More importantly, to winter is to recognize the absolute necessity of letting the fields of life go fallow for a season. Wintering takes an act of faith to say that my soils will be devoid of all nutrients unless I allow the Spirit to replenish them through rest. Think about how hard it is to take rest in our busy society where production and achievement are so highly prized.

February is a perfect time to practice wintering. Our bodies are hard-wired to winter when the days grow short. Our circadian rhythms are attuned to the seasons and call us to rest more during the long nights. We often fight these rhythms like toddlers scream and fuss to stay awake, even as their bodies grow more and more tired. Why not take these cues to find rest in prayer, sacred conversations, a good book, or a warm fire? Why not follow the example of Christ who frequently took sabbath rest, away from his growing crowds and busy schedule?

May you find rest and renewal in the rhythms of the season, and may the Lord bless your wintering with an abundance of energy for the coming spring.


Sarah Henken has served as a mission co-worker since 2010. After six years serving as regional liaison for the Andean countries of South America (Bolivia, Colombia, Peru and Venezuela), in 2017 her ministry shifted to a key focus on peace initiatives with the Presbyterian Church of Colombia (known as the IPC after its Spanish

name). Sarah works in collaboration with the peace commission of the IPC as the church strives to help all Colombians build a new future and bring an end to over 50 years of armed conflict.

A lifelong peace advocate, Sarah helps develop educational materials and programs for the promotion of peace and reconciliation within churches and communities. She engages in diaconal ministry with groups of campesino farmers displaced by the violence as they seek new land to farm and strive to sustain their families. Sarah also coordinates the Young Adult Volunteers who serve alongside the IPC in a variety of ministries. Her home base is in Barranquilla, on Colombia's Caribbean coast. She also visits churches and communities throughout the country.

Reflection is a good thing



Earth Day is coming in April and the Creation Care Team will begin to make plans. I've been thinking about the pieces I wrote for the eNews talking about the use of plastics and its effect on the environment and our health. Reflecting on my practices is a good thing.

For Christmas I received a set of glass food storage containers. I continue to use the flat silicone lids but too often reach for plastic wrap or baggies. I found stretchy edge silicone round and rectangular lids that are in my Amazon cart. I shared some of my plastics information with my sister-in-law and when I looked in her refrigerator recently I saw loads of Mason jars storing food.

I mentioned being dismayed at all the plastic bags of compost I buy for the garden. My husband got me a truckload of composted cow manure from Dungeness Creamery which I spread on the garden beds last fall. I am thankful my daughter lives locally and is willing to help with labor.

I stopped buying cherry tomatoes in single use plastic when a Roma would do. Sunny Farms sells more unpackaged produce so I like shopping there. I get to Sequim every couple of weeks so shopping there for produce and meat is convenient plus I also take my glass recycling to Sequim on the same trip.

One failure on my part is still using Swiffer mop throw away pads. That comes down to the whole issue of convenience which so often affects our earth friendly practices. Quite a few of you shared comments with me about the eNews pieces. I ask that you again share with me any lasting successes regarding reducing your use of plastics. My chats with individuals often inspire my own practices. Like the theme in the January Eco-Tip "just do the next thing" in your journey caring for God's creation.
