

From the Heart

Dear Friends in Christ,

Thank you for your cards, prayers, and condolences at the passing of my father. Mourning the loss of a loved one is not easy, but I have been blessed by your care and compassion. I would like to take a moment to share a little about my dad.

Huibert Paul was born in Rotterdam, The Netherlands, on March 1, 1928. He was the youngest of four children and was raised on a farm outside the city. His parents were members of the Dutch Reformed Church, and he grew up with daily Scripture readings at the supper table and weekly worship attendance. (Last year, he gave me a prayer book he had received in his youth and kept all his life.)

In 1940, the Nazis invaded Holland and occupied the country. The war changed the course of my father's life. During the war, his parents hid Jews on their farm, most notably a young boy named Saul, whose parents had been sent to a concentration camp. Remarkably, Saul's parents survived the camps and were reunited with him after the war. My dad was proud of his parents for their faith and bravery and kept as a cherished possession a placard commemorating his parents' enshrinement among the Righteous of the Nations at Yad Vashem Holocaust Museum in Israel.

In February 1945, just weeks before his seventeenth birthday, my dad was abducted by the Germans and sent to a labor camp on the eastern front, outside of Berlin. There, he was forced to dig ditches for the Germans as they battled Soviet troops in the closing days of the war. For most of his life, the only story he would tell of his experience was a memory of a Soviet officer on a white horse who announced that his camp had been liberated. It was only in the last decade or so of his life that he began to open up about the horrors he encountered during his imprisonment, and this only at the prompting of my stepbrother's wife. He would later share his story at schools and synagogues.

The experience left a mark on him, and it was only recently that I began to understand that he had suffered from post-traumatic stress syndrome for most of his life. Like so many of his generation who had seen the carnage of war, he was never treated for the psychological scars he bore.

My dad was not the kind of father one reads about on typical Father's Day cards. He did not care much for sports, he did not hunt or fish, nor was he particularly handy around the house. Although he did not impart to me much of the skills or wisdom found on greeting cards, he nevertheless shaped who I am and how I experience the world around me. From him I gained a love for animals, a curiosity about the world, an interest in civic life, and a strong desire for peace.

At his graveside service, the pastor spoke of God's knowledge of us and our innermost parts. Maybe it was the result of an undiagnosed trauma, or just part of his introverted nature, but my dad rarely opened up to those around him. As I remember him, I find myself in mourning for the person I never got to fully know. This is the burden of loss, isn't it? Death brings with it the reality of unfulfilled hopes and dreams that one must find ways to cope with in this life—which pretty much describes the process of mourning.

I take comfort knowing that my dad is in God's presence now, embraced and fully healed by his creator. This Christmas will bring with it a new appreciation for me of the Incarnation, and what it says about God that God would dare to become flesh and dwell in all the complexity, misery, and fleeting joy of human life. Today, I know only in part, but one day I will know fully, even as we are all fully known... just as God has always known my dad. Thank you for letting me share about my dad. I pray these thoughts will help you this holiday season as you remember loved ones who have gone before you to the Lord. And may Emmanuel, God with Us, grant you peace.







First Presbyterian Church of Port Angeles is the host this year for the PMGS Community Christmas Concert. All are invited to come and celebrate in song the birth of our Savior.

As we are a blessing to our local church, we can be a blessing to those who are in the wider body of Jesus Christ. The Christmas Joy Offering provides assistance to current and retired church workers and their families in their time of need and develops our future leaders at Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color.

October Financials

The capital spending reflects the elevator safety lock and the finished heating and cooling upgrade, copier for front office, new sound bar and new microphones for worship. The Capital projects gift has funded new windows, exterior paint touch up, and the start of a tree removal. Christmas generosity has started. As of October 31 we have \$3995 donated to Presbyterian Disaster Assistance.

Donations for Christmas grocery gift cards, Operation Christmas Child and TAFY Christmas Stockings are arriving regularly. God commands us to love God and each other in Matthew 22:37-39.

Session Actions

The Session met in a hybrid meeting in the upstairs classroom at the church and online via Zoom on Monday, November 18 at 7 pm and the following actions were taken:

- Approved the request for Peninsula Men's Gospel Singers to hold their Christmas Concert at FPCPA on December 20 at 7 pm.
- Approved splitting any additional surplus funds that need to be allocated to the Mission Budget at the end of 2024 between MANNA and the Food Bank.

Session Actions continued:

- Approved continuing with the policy approved in 2001 by Session to allow for the American flag to be displayed in the church sanctuary on the Sunday closest to Memorial Day, July 4, and Veterans Day. Session also approved to offer that the flag could be displayed in the sanctuary at the funeral of service members and their spouses if the family desires that it be present.
- Approved adding Cyber Suite Coverage and Umbrella Coverage to the churchs insurance policy.
- Approved designating the Thanksgiving service offering to MANNA.
- Approved bereavement leave for Pastor Matt from November 20 – November 24 to attend his father's burial service and celebration of life.



As the Business Development Manager, I would like to personally thank you for making our work possible. We are privileged to be the lead agency for housing and shelter in Clallam County. Your generosity supports our operations as we pour our full heart and effort into sheltering and housing our homeless and low-income neighbors.

In 2024, Serenity House increased our services and outreach in many ways. The 6-bed medical respite program in partnership with Callaim County Health and Human Services and Olympic Peninsula Community Clinior/RedisCOVERY at our shelter served 40 homeless patients, better assist them as they come out of hospital stays and need extra care. Our 2nd Annue Tail Fundraiser, held at the new Field Arts and Events Hall on October 25th, was a success with over 60 attendees! We are estimating that over \$12,000 was raised for Serenity House.
