From the Heart

Dear Friends in Christ,

If you or someone you know has ever been hurt by the Church or by other Christians, you know how painful that can be. Those wounds can run deep, leave lasting scars, and in some cases never fully heal. Sometimes a word or event can trigger past traumas and resurface old wounds we thought had gone away. How can we heal from such wounds? Where can we go for help when the place we sought refuge is the same place that afflicted us in the first place? And how can we help others who have suffered spiritual abuse?

Spiritual abuse can take on many forms. Sometimes it can be a single incident directed at an individual, like a dispute that gets out of hand, leading to unkind words or actions in the heat of the moment. Sometimes these are unhealthy or abusive patterns that go unchecked and leave entire communities wounded. Then there are the much-publicized cases of systemic abuses like in the Roman Catholic Church or more recently in the Southern Baptist Convention where cases of misconduct and child abuse have been covered up by the church or simply swept under the rug.

In addition to conflicts within the church, the very teachings themselves can cause harm. Women have been told by pastors to remain in abusive relationships, for example, because of the church's interpretation of certain biblical passages.

Some have been wounded when the church's teachings have led them to judge or exclude family members based on their religious beliefs, ethnic origin, sexual orientation, gender identity, or any number of other categories.

It is a wonder that the Church has survived the harm it has inflicted on others in Jesus' name over the centuries!

As someone who has experienced the best and the worst of the Church during my 28 years of ordained ministry, I would like to open the door to share our experiences of being wounded by the Church. My hope is that by revisiting past church-related trauma in a safe and confidential setting, we can experience some healing and a renewal of our hearts. This can take place one on one, or if you are interested in a small group setting, I'd like to invite you to consider a four-week small group opportunity that Becca and I will host in our home from 7 - 8:30 pm beginning, Thursday, September 26th, entitled *Wounded by the Church*. This will be the first in a series of four-week small group experiences we are calling *Small Talks on Big Issues* that will take place between now and next June. Note: space is limited to ten people, and there is a process for registering, so please look for the *Small Talks on Big Issues* write-up for more details.

In my experience, people who have been hurt by the Church tend to feel alone or have trouble finding safe, healthy outlets to express their trauma. This is not surprising, because Christians and Christian institutions can both be the source of great help and great harm. Once someone has been traumatized, it can make trusting other Christians and churches that much more difficult. When this happens, it can lead to a spiral of despair and even a loss of faith.

If this resonates with you or someone you are close to, please know that you/they are not alone. Time and time again, Jesus spoke out about the harm the religious leaders were causing the people they were supposed to shepherd. He also offered another way, one of self-giving love, humility, and forgiveness. May the Lord open paths for healing.

Small Talks on Big Issues

Thursday Evening Small Groups, 7 - 8:30 pm

Small Talks on Big Issues are four-week small group opportunities for people to delve into some weighty subjects in a caring, supportive, and confidential community of brothers and sisters in Christ. Groups will meet at 7:00 pm at the Pauls' home and share a dessert before entering into conversations on sensitive topics close to many of our hearts. Topics will vary throughout the year, and participants are only asked to commit to any one four-week session.

Because space is limited and building trust is critical, please consider the following to determine whether this small group experience is for you:

- 1. Does the subject personally affect you or someone you love?
- 2. Are you willing to explore the intersection of faith and the subject matter with a spirit of curiosity? Curiosity is key, because these are not easy subjects with pat answers—in fact, you may end up with more questions.
- 3. Are you willing to be vulnerable, share openly, listen to others, and engage in sensitive discussions, all while listening to the Holy Spirit speak through others and through the experience? Because these subjects will personally resonate with members of the group, good listening and heartfelt sharing will be the keys to creating a supportive and safe community.
- 4. Can you make the time commitment to attend all four gatherings?

Small Talks on Big Issues is not for everyone, but for those with a burning desire to share their stories and struggles with a goal of seeking better understanding of the topics and of oneself, this might be just right for you. If you are interested in taking part, please contact Pastor Matt for more information and to complete the registration process.

Session One: Wounded by the Church

Some call it spiritual abuse: when the fellowship community that is supposed to demonstrate the love and compassion of Jesus Christ misuses its power and authority and causes harm to individuals or whole groups of people. 

The firstfruits of hope (Rom 8:19-25)

Each year from September 1st to October 4th the Christian family unites for the Season of Creation, a worldwide celebration of prayer and action to protect our common home. It is a special season where we celebrate God as Creator and acknowledge Creation as a divine continuing act that summons us as collaborators to love and care for the gift of all that is created. As followers of Christ from around the globe, we share a common call to care for Creation. We are all part of what God has made. Our well-being is interwoven with the well-being of the Earth.

We rejoice in this opportunity to safeguard our common home and all who share it. As people of faith, we are called to lift the hope inspired by our faith, the hope of resurrection. This is not a hope without action but one embodied in concrete actions.

The theme for 2024 is "To hope and act with Creation" and the symbol is "The first fruits of hope" inspired by Romans 8:19-25:

19 For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the children of God; 20 for the creation was subjected to futility, not of its own will but by the will of the one who subjected it, in hope 21 that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to decay and will obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. 22 We know that the whole creation has been groaning in labor pains until now; 23 and not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly while we wait for adoption, the redemption of our bodies. 24 For in hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what is seen? 25 But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

The different dimensions of hope:

- Christian hope is not superficial, it's concrete. Our hope is rooted in God's character, promises, and actions.
- To change the system, we must change our mindsets.
- Active hope in our Christian communities can be seen in the care of creation, hearing the voices of the vulnerable, hearing the cries of the Earth.
- Because we are hopeful, we can act and so see what we hope for.
- Transformation takes time, we have to be patient. Hope is also a process, requires patience.
- Hope is faith in the things we do not see, hope is knowing that tomorrow
 will be better because Christ is resurrected, He defeated all evil. Everlasting
 life overcomes all things.

Action as a sign of the first fruits of hope:

Action as the first fruits of hope can look like many different things:
 advocacy campaigns, sustainability initiatives, and educational formations to
 help upskill Christian communities in their awareness of how to care for
 Creation is central to our faith.

The first fruits of hope can be seen when we think and work collectively, when we recognize how we depend on Creation, when we listen to the Earth, when we listen to the voices of our local and global neighbors impacted by climate change, when we listen to the prophetic voices of indigenous peoples, when we listen to the different creatures that are going extinct and the ones still striving to live, when we listen to the voices of young people and children, when we learn from the slow and powerful cycles of life of different species, ecosystems, and biomes, when we work together with Creation and all creatures for a better future.

Rainy Birch enjoyed having Mr. Ed Jaquins as her teacher at Jefferson Elementary School in 1976-77. He taught us really useful things like how to address an envelope for mailing, how to spell *Juan de Fuca* and *Clallam County*. He encouraged us all to try out for spelling bee, believing we were all capable. He taught confidence!

From **Tom McCulloch** - My favorite teacher was Mr. Hays. He was my history teacher, and he taught me a lot about world history. Actually, I had a lot of great teachers. The school that I went to was called Woodstock School located in Mussoorie, India in the foothills of the Himalayas. The school was for missionary children from all denominations. We had people not just from America and Canada but from many other countries including Indians. There is a vast diaspora of Woodstock alumni all over the world. My parents met at this school and were married at the school.

Slowing the Waters

The weather here has been as nice as it can be Although it doesn't really matter much to me. As far as I'm concerned each day's a rainy day And it might as well rain until September



Every time I heard that song as a teen, I could swear my summer was cursed with a rain shower. How

times have changed. Today we pray for some summer rain (no lightening, please) and we look for ways to conserve.

Ten-plus years in planning, the Dungeness Off-Channel Reservoir Project's objective is to store water in the winter and spring in order to disburse it during dry summer months for salmon spawning and farm irrigation. The reservoir will create a climate resilient water supply and a new county park while restoring streamflow, recharging the aquifer, and providing floodwater management. It's a modern day application of ancient water retention practices. For project updates: tinyurl.com/38krbzsy

We can use water in our gardens more efficiently in several ways. By watering less often but more deeply we lose less to evaporation. Another trick to slowing water loss is watering between 4 and 9 a.m.

Mulch (bark, wood chips, leaves, straw, etc.) also discourages evaporation and moderates soil temperature. Water at the roots. You can also trap water by building small berms around plants to create miniature reservoirs. Consider soaker hoses which ensure 90% of your water is going to your plants.

Did you know that dishwasher manufacturers compare their machines' water consumption with hand washing while the faucet is running? Am I the only one who doesn't leave the faucet on? Here's the beat-the-machine game I play when I hand wash. Start with an empty dishpan and a wet, soapy dishcloth. Wipe the dish clean and rinse it over the dishpan, faucet on only when needed...a trickle works. Wet the dish-cloth in the pan and repeat. Extra dirty dishes get wiped and rinsed outside then dishpan. This method only uses a gallon or two. Did I win?

During WWII, our parents and grandparents learned to live on less and make use of what was on hand. Hopefully we'll never need ration cards for water, but we too can learn to live comfortably with less. There are so many ideas and resources just a Google away. I'll leave you with this thoughtful quote from the Sioux nation:

A frog does not drink up the pond in which he lives.


